|-----------------------------------|---|
| <b>Narrative</b>                  | a spoken or written account of connected events; a story.                                 |
| <b>Fiction</b>                    | literature in the form of <b>prose</b> that describes <b>imaginary</b> events and people. |
| <b>Norse</b>                      | relating to ancient or medieval Norway or Scandinavia.                                    |
| <b>Co-ordinating conjunction</b>  | A word used to join two independent clauses together.                                     |
| <b>Sub-ordinating conjunction</b> | “a word such as 'although', 'because', or 'when' which begins a subordinate clause”       |
| <b>Mythical creature</b>          | an imaginary <b>creature</b> usually having various human and animal parts.               |

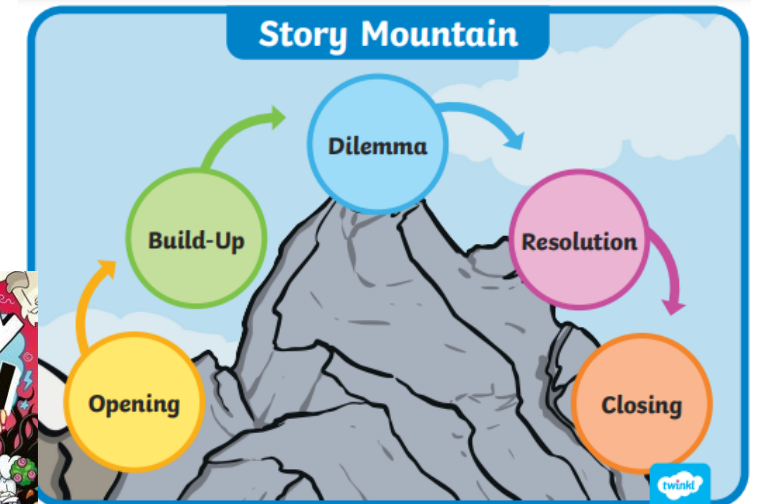

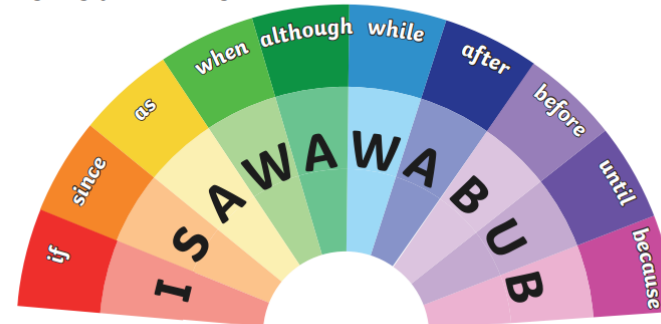
### Co-ordinating Conjunctions

Here are 10 of the most common subordinating conjunctions. They are used at the beginning of a subordinating clause which is a clause that doesn't make sense on its own.

- Arthur walked **happily** over the bridge.
- The rope snapped **cleanly** in half.
- The creature growled **scarily** at the boy.
- The door opened **creakily**.
