ESSENTIAL VOCABULARY	
Myth	A traditional story, especially one concerning the early history of a people or explaining a natural or social phenomenon, and typically involving <u>supernatural beings</u> or events.
Ancient	Old
Mortal	Like a human being (has a lifecycle)
God/Goddess	An immortal being
Underworld	the <u>mythical abode</u> of the dead, <u>imagined</u> as being under the earth.
Moral	a lesson that can be derived from a story or experience.

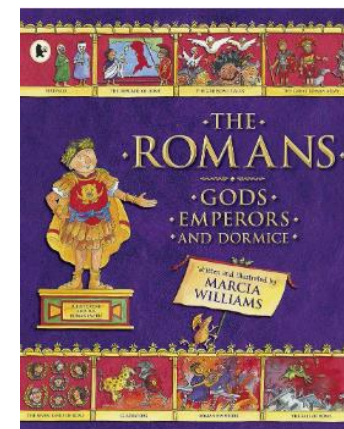
Simile/metaphors

Beginning and End
Keep your inverted commas at the beginning and the end of the words being spoken.
"Stop!" I said.

New Speaker, New Line
Start a new line whenever someone new speaks.
"How are you doing today?" asked Henry.
"I'm great!" said Ashton.

Capital Letter
Begin what is spoken with a capital letter!
"What an amazing day!" he announced.

Commas
Remember to add commas.
Ashton whispered, "Be quiet!"
"Goodbye," said Jules.

Punctuation
Make sure your speech is correctly punctuated!
"There are times, I feel, that you are a little cold," I said.
